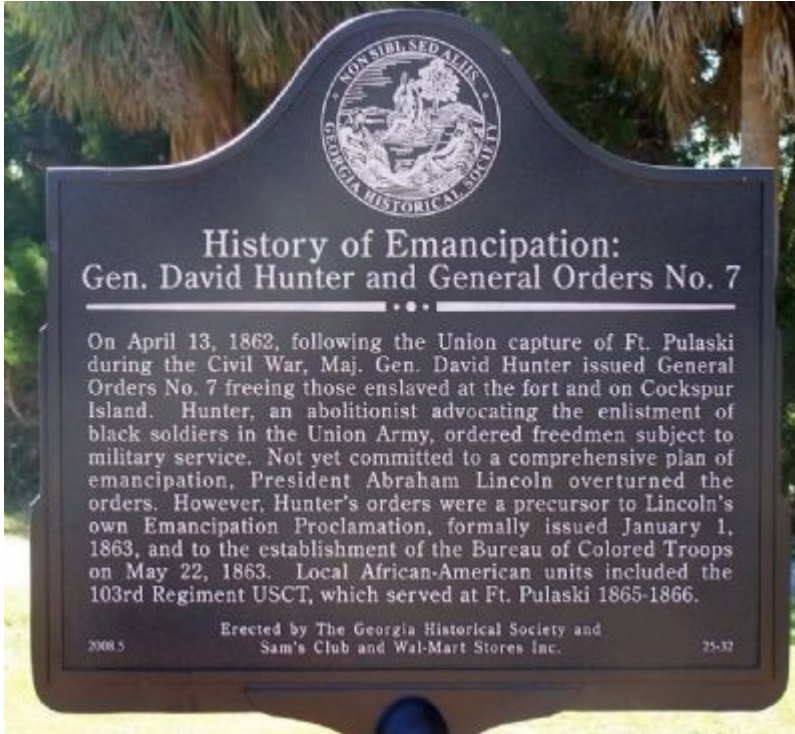

The USCT and the Road to Emancipation

To commemorate the 150 anniversary of Maj. Gen. David Hunter's issue of General Orders No. 7. Gen. David Hunter (July 21, 1802 – February 2, 1886) was a Union general in the American Civil War. He achieved fame by his unauthorized 1862 order (immediately rescinded) emancipating slaves in three Southern states: Georgia, Florida and South Carolina, comprising the military department of the south. Gen. Hunter also served as the president of the military commission trying the conspirators involved with the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln.

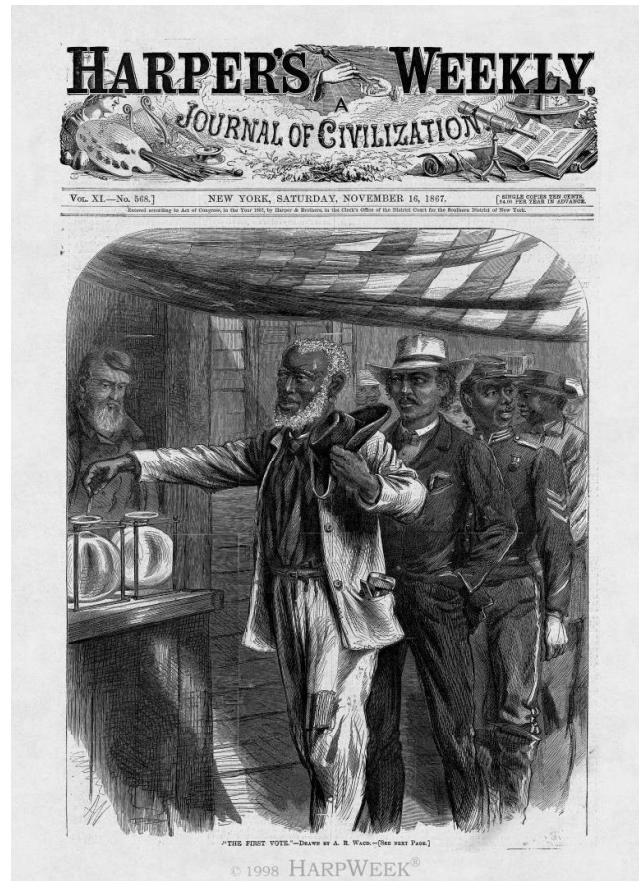
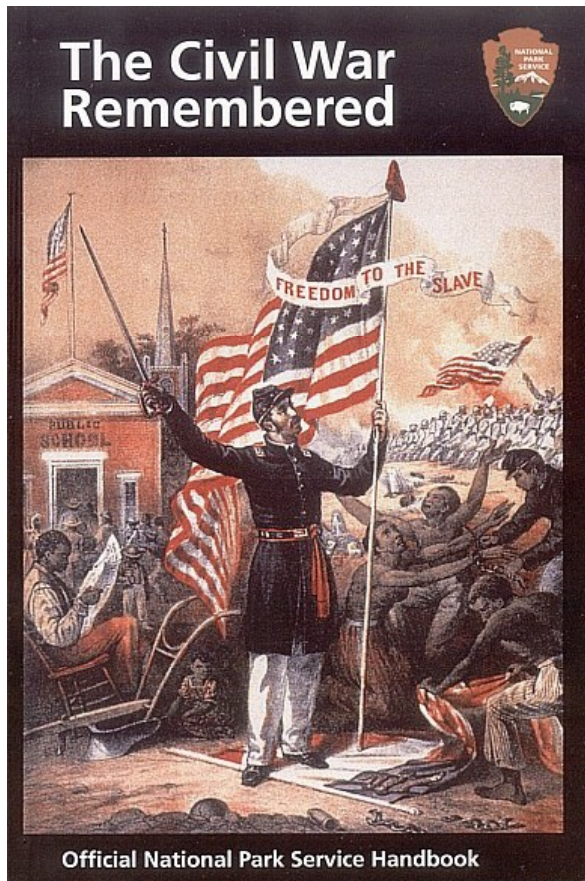

In the aftermath of America's Civil War it was accepted that the union had been saved, but "The reinauguration of the national authority-reconstruction" (*A. Lincoln*) and the establishment of full participatory democracy was still very much in doubt. This lecture will expose ignored historical facts, and reveal the hidden Civil Rights legacy of how Black Civil War veterans reconstituted the nation in alignment with the DECLARATION and established the foundation of citizens' voting rights in the United States of America.

*Asa Gordon is founder and executive director of the Douglass Institute of Government (DIG). DIG is an “*educational think tank*” based in Washington, DC. He also serves as the Secretary-General of the Sons & Daughters of the United States Colored Troops (S&DUSCT). The S&DUSCT is chartered by the African American Civil War Memorial Freedom Foundation to augment its mission and to use the national monument ‘*The Spirit of Freedom*’ to honor the historical legacy of those who served in the United States Colored Troops (USCT) during the American Civil War.

Gordon was appointed by Congressman Bobby Scott (D-VA) to the New Market Heights Memorial Advisory Committee to help devise a memorial to commemorate the 14 African American soldiers of the United States Colored Troops awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor at the Battle of New Market Heights September 28th, 1864.

Further, as a retired NASA astrodynamacist, Gordon is published in international scientific journals. His research has been employed by private industry, both domestically and abroad for tracking satellites in space. He served two terms as President of the Goddard Engineers, Scientists and Technicians Association (GESTA). His work in science is also referenced in Ivan Van Sertima’s “*Blacks in Science - Ancient and Modern.*”



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
